
STUNNING!

EARTH Deepa Mehta (India) The second part of Metha's Fire/Earth/Water trilogy examines the subject of India's partition and is based on an autobiography. The setting is Lahore in 1947, a city in which Hindu, Muslim, Sikh and Parsee communities coexist in harmony. However independence from Britain is looming, with the proposal for a separate Muslim country, Pakistan. Initially,

the prospect of violent change appears far removed from the group of young adults who gravitate around a Hindu nanny, Shanta. But almost overnight the mood changes and friends find themselves on opposing sides, their lives shattered. 16mm, in English and Hindi with English subtitles.

DEATH IN BRUNSWICK John Ruane (Australia) Ruane's first feature, a black comedy about a cook at a seedy nightclub who becomes caught up in the death of a Turkish kitchen hand. Set in the inner-urban Melbourne suburb of Brunswick which has a large Greek and Turkish population, the film skilfully integrates ethnic humour into the narrative. It begins episodically in a naturalistic mode only to subtly shift into absurdist comedy with a surreal edge. 16mm

KLUTE Alan Pakula (USA) This film works both as a genre entertainment —a suspense thriller in which an expoliceman investigates the mysterious disappearance of a research scientist—and as a character study of some psychological and moral complexity. The real centre is Jane Fonda's portrayal of a high-bracket call girl, Bree, who wants to quit yet enjoys the control she exercises over her customers. 16mm cinemascope.



KING KUT COMEDY NO. 1 One of the last silent features made in Australia, a ludicrous plot in which the King of Port Melbourne, from his palace in the Melbourne Alps, wages war with the Tsar of Carlton. 16mm

DON'S PARTY Bruce Beresford (Australia) This satire of university educated upwardly mobile ALP supporters is set in a suburb on Sydney's North Shore on the night of the 1969 Federal Election. The satire achieves its bite through a sense of what passes for naturalism. The essential ockerism of the males becomes more apparent as the party degenerates and the alcohol takes over. The critical focus sharpens and the humour becomes more cynical. 16mm

CAMP DE THIAROYE (CAMP THIAROYE) Ousmane Sembene (Africa) A critique of the colonial mentality and a stinging indictment of military injustice and racism based on an actual historical incident that took place at the end of World War II (a turning point in African history when the colonial myth of white superiority began to collapse and an African consciousness emerged). In 1944, African infantrymen, back from fighting the Nazis and liberating Paris, relax in a transit camp in Senegal ostensibly for temporary internment before discharge. The real purpose, however, is to reestablish the structures of white oppression disrupted by the war. A

SATIN ROUGE Raja Amari (Tunisia) Tunisian films have always been at the forefront of permissiveness in Arabic cinema, Red Satin is no exception. Sensual, musical drama about a Rubenesque Tunisian widow who casts aside her solitary existence after discovering a subculture that embraces her curvaceous figure — the belly-dancing scene! Perhaps a little slow in the beginning, but like the dancing in the cabaret, it picks up to a rapid pace by the end. VHS, in Arabic with English subtitles.

LANTANA Ray Lawrence (Australia) One woman's



death –perhaps murder– sparks a crisis in a series of interconnecting relationships. Leon is a policeman investigating the woman's disappearance, who's emotional stolidity is reflected in his violent dealings with clients; his wife Sonja seeks counselling for her desolate personal state; her therapist Valerie, is struggling to cope with the death of her daughter and the deterioration of her marriage to

John; Jane, a lonely and aimless woman, is estranged from her husband Pete and seeks sex with Leon. Miscommunication and secret trysts (real and imagined) lead characters to draw false conclusions. Several red herrings increase the intensity of the murder mystery, but the real concern of the film is the kaleidoscope of human failings and interactions, reflecting a complex interweaving of intent and desire. VHS
