The Bendigo Film Society reserves the right to substitute film titles should the need arise The Western commands interest for at least two reasons. three decades (late 30s to late 60s) it was the most popular and fertile of all Hollywood genres, attracting many of America's most distinguished film-makers. need only mention such figures as John Ford, Howard Hawks, Sam Peckinpah and Arthur Secondly, the revisionist phase of the genre (mid-60s onwards), in which the ideological assumptions and prevailing values of the classical Western were challenged, inverted and satirized, provides us with a barometer of the changing cultural climate in America.

The 2004 BFS program offers a fascinating selection of Westerns.

- Jubal (1956), an interesting work by a neglected craftsman of the genre.
- Delmer Daves is one of John Ford's master-works
- the elegiac The Man Who Shot Liberty Valance (1964) in which the economy, poise and beauty

of Ford's style is on full display (the first fifteen minutes of the film are positively ravishing!) and superb performances from two of the genre's iconic actors, John Wayne and Jimmy Stewart

- Sergio Leone's Fistful of Dollars (filmed in 1964 but not released in the USA until 1967), the first of the "spaghetti Westerns" which not only catapulted Clint Eastwood into international stardom but also introduced the incomparable Enrico Morricone
- also from the revisionist period,
   Mel Brooks' chaotic and engaging spoof, Blazing Saddles (1973)
- Finally, the most imposing Western made in the last two decades, Unforgiven (1992), perhaps the crowning achievement of Clint Eastwood's long and illustrious career as both actor and director.

A wonderful sample of Westerns — enjoy!
