Vertigo Alfred Hitchcock (USA 1958) PG

The greatest film ever made? So say the critic at Senses of Cinema. James Stewart plays a detective who has left the police force because his fear of heights has caused, he believes, a tragedy. When an old college friend summons him to investigate the eccentric actions of his psychologically perplexing wife (Kim Novak), Stewart's life takes a new, obsessive course from which he never recovers. Not only does Hitchcock demonstrate a total mastery of cinematic point-of-view, but he turns what might have been mere melodrama into film poetry. Perhaps his greatest film." Kahn's control of mood that best distinguishes his films, and
music, colour, composition, camera movement and cutting are
all here masterfully combined to create a genuinely
